(A bit of trivia - The Tenakill is one of the few rivers that flow north). Take a look at the photo accompanying this article. This photo is not doctored! This is the Tenakill Brook entering the Oradell Reservoir in Closter, our public drinking water supply. Unsightly? Yes. Costly to clean? Yes. Harmful to wildlife? Possibly.

Many of these items, "floatables" were either deposited directly into the Brook or were washed into the Brook through storm drains. As Ben Franklin said, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure".

Wherever you are; the shore, in your car, in a park, in the Demarest Nature Center, please use litter receptacles to dispose of trash. Remember, carry out whatever you carry in with you and deposit waste in a trash receptacle. If we can carry around a full container, we can certainly carry the same container when empty to the nearest trash receptacle. By not littering, the Nature Center benefits, towns benefit, communities benefit, the environment benefits and if that is not enough, your wallet benefits!
