Greetings to all! I hope everyone had a happy holiday

and a safe and successful New Year.

I'd like to thank all who were able to join us for the various activities we sponsored throughout 2009. We couldn't have done it without you. Your membership in the Nature Center and patronage at our events support a variety of school programs that we sponsor.

Coming up this year will be Naturalist Mark Gussen's nature tour with our kindergarteners in the Nature Center. Marc will also conduct a class on butterflies for the first graders.

We'll also sponsor a field trip for the second graders to Abmas Farm (www. abmasfarm.com/). A north New Jersey working farm "for the past eighty years and four generations".

The third graders get to experience the specialness and beauty of Greenbrook Sanctuary (www.njpalisades.org/ greenbrook.htm) in Alpine where the naturalist will conduct a program that dove tails with their studies.

The forth graders will experience Marc Gussen's wonderful presentation of the Lenni Lanape Indians and their high tech tools of the day.

The Lenni Lanape Indians inhabited this area at the time the first Europeans arrived.

The sixth graders will explore the rainforest courtesy of the New Jersey Batman, (www.njbatman.com/). Quick Facts: One and one-half acres of rainforest are lost every second. In New Jersey we lose forty acres of open space each day. That's like the Demarest Nature Center being destroyed in a day and a half. The New Jersey Batman will also conduct a program for the seventh graders to learn about bats and how this misunderstood mammal is so important to our environment and our survival. *Quick Fact: A single little brown bat can eat up from 500-1,000 mosquitoes in a single hour, and is one of the world's longest-lived mammals for its size, with a life span of almost 40 years.*

Your support also allows us to award a \$1000 scholarship every year to a senior from NV Demarest, Holy Angels or any child of a member of the Demarest Nature Center who has been accepted into a college or university to pursue a course of study related to the environmental sciences.

As you also know, your financial support funds the upkeep of our Nature Center. It pays for the tools and materials to establish and maintain our trails and common areas. We again want to thank the Michael Robertson

Charitable Foundation for their generous donation this year. If you remember, last year's contribution went towards the hiring of naturalist Marc Gussen to assist us in identifying trees on the Gus Stumpp Loop and to purchase identification tags. This year, the foundation helped us blaze the new Closter Trail. It starts at the tennis courts in Wakelee Field and proceeds north into Closter. The contribution allowed us to purchase materials for three bridges and two boardwalks as well as the blazes for the trail. You can read a review of the trail by founding member and current trustee Dave Emerson inside. Dave, besides being part of almost everything that has happened in the Nature Center since 1973, was instrumental in establishing this trail.

New Adventures in Demarest by Dave Emerson

This past summer we developed two new trails in the Demarest Nature Center. We have partnered with the Closter Environmental Commission and the Closter Nature Center to include the Closter Green Acres Trails and Features on our DNC Trail Map. The two new trails begin at the tot lot and tennis parking lot behind Wakelee Field.

The first trail is The Race Track Trail. It is a one mile loop trail and is well marked with a red blaze. Start at the trailhead (red diamond trail marker) between the first bridge and the skating pond. Proceed North on The Tenakill Brook Trail along the east side of the stream. Past the Morton Bridge, the trail will turn right toward the swim club. At this point follow the red marker to the left and continue North along the brook. Watch for the Kingfisher flying over the water, catching his meal. You may also see the stately four foot Great Blue Herron (our DNC symbol) wading and waiting in the brook. There will be Mallard Ducks and Canadian Geese swimming, grazing the bottom for aquatic weeds and catching insects and crustations in the mud. (These are year round events) Continue North to the round DNC entrance sign. Just past this sign, the red diamond blaze directs you to the right. (If you go straight along the brook, you will come to the Closter footbridge, to the West side of the brook, and on to Durie Ave.) Take this red trail to the right, to the quarter mile Closter race track which is popular with dog walkers. It is a beautiful walk in the woods around the track if you want to lengthen your one mile walk. Turn right on the track for a short distance, leave the track to the right following the red diamond. Continue South over a board walk, turn left toward the railroad tracks. The red trail passes through an old stand hardwood forest of Oak, Maple, and Tulip trees. Watch for deer and squirrel and an occasional raccoon, red fox, or possum. At the round DNC entrance sign, continue South through the woods, parallel to the tracks, to the Swim Club parking lot and handball court. Go to the right and reenter the wooded red trail which leads back to the brook. Turn left and continue South to your car.

The second new trail is the Closter Trail and marked with a diamond shaped blue blaze. The trailhead starts on the path along the north edge of the playground and tennis court. It is a half mile trail to the Closter race track. The blue trail winds north behind the swim club and crosses a few streams as you amble through this old growth forest. Watch for a spring on the left which bubbles warm water, grows watercress and duckweed, and flows all year long. In the winter, with snow on the ground, you will see the plants green and happy throughout the freezing weather. You will cross the red trail and continue North. The blue trail ends when you reach the Closter race track.

At this point you have three options:

One. Turn around and retrace your steps on the blue trail back to your car.

Two. Take the race track white diamond trail to the right. Follow the path half way around the track. A yellow trail will leave the race track to the right and cross a bridge to a grassy fire road. Turn right to the A&P parking lot.

Three. Turn left on the race track and follow the red blaze to the Tenakill Brook. Turn left along the brook, back to your starting point.

Both trails are an interesting and entertaining addition to our DNC trail system. They are both a leisurely hour walk through our contiguous Demarest and Closter Green Acre woods.
