# **President's Message**

Demarest, on a hot, summer day in the early 90's. My windows were open, so I checked the dash to see if the air conditioner had gone on.... it had not. Sure, I saw the obvious – lots of mature trees lining the streets. But, at the time, the Demarest Nature Center was not on my radar. Those 55 green acres were back there pumping out oxygen, contributing to the coolness.

Not too long after that drive, I found the entrance and walked a trail. This discovery has changed my life in so many positive ways. I'm there often observing birds and fauna. Its existence renews my optimism. Its preservation, a promise to earth's next inhabitants.

Preservation however, doesn't mean stagnation. Since my discovery, I've witnessed major changes. Including two new, steel pedestrian bridges now connecting trails across the Tenakill Brook.

Trees along the Gus Stump Trail have been tagged, with both Latin and common names and identifying characteristics.

And, this sounds too simple to say, and was no easy feat – three whole, new trail systems, the Nine Bridges, Closter, and Trestle Bridge Trails were added, complete with boardwalks, foot bridges, blazes and carved, wooden signs.

As I write this, past president, Kevin Riley, and the 2012 Senior DNVHS volunteers, Gil, Tammy, Hyo, and Jared, are clearing the Rail Road Station Trail, which is the starting point for the Northern Valley Trail. NVT will connect trails through Demarest, Closter, Norwood, both Boy Scout camps, to a Palisades Interstate Park trail, and on up to Harriman Park, where it will connect to the Appalachian Trail.

It's no wonder, I'm in awe of the founders and trustees, past and present, who saw, manifested, hone and maintain such an educational, recreational and totally immersible environment for all to enjoy. And, a huge "thanks" to all you members for helping sustain this treasure.

# **Educating our Children**

**DNC Continues** to Provide Environmental Education for the Children of Demarest

This school year the Demarest Nature Center has continued its mission of providing environmental resources to the children of Demarest Public Schools. The charismatic naturalist Marc Gussen led our kindergarten and 1st grade classes of the County Road School on an exploration of the Demarest Nature Center in search of the various flora and fauna. Mr. Gussen also addressed each fourth grade class on the topic of the Lenape natives of New Jersey in correlation with the fourth grade Social Studies curriculum. Financial resources were provided by the DNC for all 2nd graders to visit the Health Barn at Abmas Farm in Wyckoff to explore nutrition, physical activity and healthy behaviors. Our 3rd grade classes received a tour of the Greenbrook Sanctuary, a special use nature preserve maintained by the Palisades Nature Association. Lastly, as a result of DNC resources our 6th graders were visited by Joseph D'Angeli the "NJ Bat Man" and director of the Wildlife Conservation and Education Center in Ridge Field Park. Mr. D'Angeli dazzled the 6th graders with a variety of exotic animals and information on wildlife conservation. Jon Regan

### **'Poison lvy Pass'**

**Toxicodendron** radicans - otherwise known as Poison Ivy, isn't really ivy at all. It does, however grow like a vine, and can be found in different forms, like a shrub. The Nature Center is loaded with great examples of biodiversity, including poison ivy. So wear some long pants as you navigate our trails or be sure to avoid the poison ivy on the edges of some of the paths. The distinct 'leaves of three' means 'let them be' and never touch the hairy vines either! 'Poison Ivy Pass,' as coined by Ella Lasky, a young Demarest resident, is along the Tenakill Brook Trail just past the skating ponds.

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# On the Appalachian Trail?

This summer, the Demarest Nature Center will be connecting its trails with those from the Nature Centers of Closter and Norwood in a project known as the Northern Valley Trail. The intention of the plan is to also connect with trails through the Boy Scout camps, the Palisades Interstate Park and eventually, The Appalachian Trail! Look out for new signs on the hiking trails marking the path.

We asked our board of trustees to share with the community their special memories or moments in the Nature Center. Some heartfelt responses came back – here's a sampling:

"The northeast corner of the nature center-east of the railroad tracks and north of the mulch piles--used to be terra incognita. Nobody went there. Now the Nine Bridges Trail winds through it. The trail goes between the hockey ponds, up to the east meadow, down a steep slope, and then back around in a big loop to the gravel road that connects County Road to the railroad tracks. There are benches along the trail and two bird feeders and plank walkways, not to mention those nine bridges.
